
This newsletter, like many before it, shows the variety of activities and events that our Romero children are involved in. On p17 you can read about the Cardinal Wiseman pupils who



Sending joy this Christmas

Long service of Romero staff recognised

Some of Coventry's longest serving staff have been honoured for their commitment to education with special awards.

The Romero Catholic Academy, which consists of secondary school Cardinal Wiseman and seven Catholic primary schools, gave out the awards at its 'Romero Celebrates' event, held at the Rialto.

Every member of staff who had served in education for more than 25 years, whether they were a teacher, cleaner, or lunchtime supervisor, was recognised.

Nine staff members from Cardinal Wiseman, five from St John Fisher, four from St Gregory's, two each from Good Shepherd and the Romero Academy, and one each from Corpus Christi, Ss Peter and Paul and St Patricks all received awards.

Gordon Rutherford, a languages teacher at Cardinal Wiseman, received an award after an incredible 42 years of teaching at the school.

He said: "I started in 1977 when Cardinal Wiseman was still a boys' school. There have been some big changes during that time, but I've loved every minute of it.

“I’ve made great friends in the staffroom over the years, and I’ve loved working with all the children, their parents and families.

In a speech before the awards were given out, Yvonne Salter Wright, Vice Chair of the Romero Catholic Academy, praised the staff for their commitment to Catholic education in Coventry.

She said: “When looking at those who were presented with the awards, you can see displayed in their work our Romero values of respect, integrity, service, and excellence.

“They have brought all their experience and skill through their careers and are deploying it now in their work within our Romero family.”

The Romero Celebrates event was set up as a way of rewarding all the staff who have worked together since the Romero Catholic Academy was created in 2015.

Patrick Taggart, Business Director of the Romero Catholic Academy, added: “The Romero Celebrates event was arranged to acknowledge the

great work of all of our staff over the last few years.

“It was a fantastic day, and it was especially nice to see our longest-serving staff receive their award. They have all done so much for education in Coventry and they all deserved to be recognised.”


progress from the primary schools to Cardinal Wiseman and see them continue their journey of learning and faith.

And later in the afternoon, the pupils enjoyed an Egyptian 'banquet' that would have been part of honouring the sun god Aten.



The day was led by Craig Hatfield from 'Off The Page', a teaching company which offers hands-on role playing days for pupils in many different subjects.

Hayley Aldrich, Assistant Vice Principal at Sacred Heart, said the day was very beneficial to the children's education.

She added: "Days like these provide such an enriching experience for the pupils - it's very important we have hands-on lessons such as this at Sacred Heart as they are always memorable for the children.

"The pupils really threw themselves into the day and were very engaged throughout. Dressing up as Ancient Egyptians and taking part in all these themed activities was really exciting for them.

"These activities also help in the classroom too - when we talk about concepts such as hieroglyphs in class, the children can relate to it a little better as they have already experienced writing their own."

Year of the Word


At the end of November, we welcomed Dan and Emily from Onelife Music to lead us in prayer and reflection to lead us into the Season of Advent.

Romero Shares ICT journey

Pupils at The Romero Catholic Academy have hugely benefited from its adoption of modern IT technology and other schools and businesses can learn from their example, a Coventry councillor has claimed.

The Romero Catholic Academy has made significant strides in the IT equipment it uses across its eight schools in Coventry, and in how it is using apprentices to solve IT problems on-site instead of relying on third-party companies.

To hear about their success, Cllr Kevin Maton, cabinet member for Education & Skills, visited Cardinal Wiseman Catholic School to meet with some of the academy's IT staff - many of whom had started within the academy as apprentices.

He was joined by Louise Campton, founder of Primary Goal - an organisation which provides IT apprentices for schools and businesses - who spoke to him about how successful apprentices have been for Romero.

Cllr Maton heard about how the academy has not only saved money by hiring in-house apprentices instead of going to third parties for support, but has provided employment opportunities for its former pupils.

Before the academy started using apprentices, staff at Romero's eight schools would have to wait up to a week for IT support, which bogged down the schools' administrative tasks and affected their pupils' education.

Louise said: "Romero is the showcase example of the benefits of hiring apprentices to help schools with IT.

"While saving money is obviously an important aspect in schools, it is actively giving young people clear pathways to improve their own skills as well as sharing them with the schools they are in.



“Romero’s apprentices are so well educated that costly callouts to external IT companies are now incredibly rare.

“We’d like to see more schools across Coventry and the country as a whole embrace apprentices and allow their pupils to reap the benefits.”

Hitesh Vara, Academy Network Manager at The Romero Catholic Academy, explained how the academy now stores all of its files in the cloud, which has meant the academy has saved thousands of pounds by not having to run expensive servers.

It has also allowed staff to work flexibly as they can access files while they are away from school as well as on-site.

Further innovations adopted by Romero include the ‘Romero University’ – where teachers can learn how to fix common IT problems online and an easy-to-use

helpdesk, which allows the IT team to prioritise tasks and solve them quickly.

It is now hoped that school and Business leaders in Coventry will meet with Cllr Maton, Primary Goal and Romero representatives to hear about their success and discuss how some of the practices and technology could be used to improve their own organisations.

Cllr Maton said: “I was very interested to hear about Romero’s success and how we can use their example to encourage all organisations to adopt similar, innovative approaches.

“This technology isn’t new - it’s all currently available for schools to use - but many might be either unaware of what’s available or perhaps unwilling to take the plunge and change their systems.

“But if we are not able to use new and emerging technology to improve our children’s education, then we are needlessly holding ourselves back.

“Alongside embracing technology, encouraging our schools to hire apprentices will save them time and money, and gives our young people more routes into employment.

“It’s so important we use what’s out there to not only improve outcomes for pupils, but to take workloads off teachers and to maximise the use of limited school budgets.

“The Romero Catholic Academy is definitely forging ahead in this regard, and I am sure more schools in Coventry will want to look into their model and see how they can apply it to benefit their own students.”

A meeting between school leaders is likely to take place in the new year.

Dancers dazzle Coventry at lights switch-on

A newly-formed dance troupe at Sacred Heart Catholic Primary School has set its sights on competition success after dazzling the crowd at Coventry's Christmas lights switch-on.

The squad of 20 pupils in Years 4 to 6 showed off their moves on stage in Broadgate in front of hundreds of people before the lights came on.

And the group is now hoping to impress in next year's 'Great Big Dance Off' - a national school dance competition.

If successful, the pupils will perform at the Alexandra Theatre in Birmingham in a regional heat, before potentially progressing to the national final.

Sophie Edge, PE lead at Sacred Heart, was very proud of the squad's performance on the night.

She said: "A lot of the pupils were very nervous beforehand - most of them had never performed on a big stage outside of school before.

"But when it was time for them to come on, they danced their socks off. They were absolutely buzzing with excitement afterwards, and I was so happy for all of them.

"It was a great opportunity for them to get used to dancing in front of people they don't know, and I think it will prepare them really well for the competition.

"We've got our fingers crossed we will be dancing at the Alexandra Theatre, and who knows what will happen after that?"

Sacred Heart's squad was only put together at the start of the academic year and were invited to perform at the lights switch-on by CV Life as part of the Coventry European City of Sport 2019 campaign.

The school then sent letters to pupils and parents asking if they would like to get involved.

Once the troupe was created, Sophie brought in Vanessa Pearson from CV Life to train them in dance and choreograph their routine.

The squad will be submitting an audition video to the Great Big Dance Off judges in December, which is a slightly more extensive version of the dance they performed at the Christmas lights switch on.

Should the judges accept their video, the pupils will be off to the Alexandra Theatre in early February.

Sophie added: "Considering many of the pupils hadn't really danced before and only been training together since September, I'm so impressed with how much they've improved as a group.

Patrick Taggart, Academy Business Director said: "This is the first time Sacred Heart has created a dance squad, and I think we will continue to form new squads in years to come.

"Our schools work very hard to provide a broad range of opportunities for our pupils and it was great to see the children showcasing their talent at the event".





Cardinal Wiseman helps build bridges with art project

Ingenious Cardinal Wiseman pupils took part in a bridge-building challenge at Coventry Cathedral as part of an engineering and art project.

The six Year 11 pupils took part in the challenge with several other Coventry schools to create 'Amaranthine', a piece of art inspired by Leonardo da Vinci bridges - which are famous for their simplicity.

Supervised by the engineering firm involved in the construction of the new Coventry Cathedral, Arup, as well as artist Jasmine McInerney, the pupils created their own da Vinci bridge out of carpet rolls, before being joined with bridges made by other schools with colourful fabric to finish off the artwork.

The event was organised by Coventry performance company Imagineer in the run up to its own project, 'Bridge', which saw a large bridge pop up in Broadgate and play host to a spectacular acrobatic performance.

Aisling McClelland, Head of Applied Arts at Cardinal Wiseman, said: "Last year, we tasked our students to design and build a scale model of a bridge at school.

"The best students were then picked to represent Cardinal Wiseman to help create Amaranthine in Coventry Cathedral.

"On the day, they had to work together as a team to create their da Vinci bridge, and it was fantastic to see how well they communicated with each other to finish off their bridge.

"I'm very proud of the pupils for contributing to such an interesting piece of art, and I hope it inspires them to continue to be creative."

And Dave Long of Imagineer, who invited Cardinal Wiseman to take part in the project, added: "Coventry Cathedral was the perfect location to hold the creation of Amaranthine.

"The cathedral builds bridges between people and communities every day - so it was only fitting that pupils built their own bridges in the cathedral.

"The project gave young people the chance to try a bit of artistic engineering for themselves, and we hope their interactions with Jasmine and the staff from Arup made them think about pursuing engineering as a career.

"The Cardinal Wiseman team showed real civic pride for Coventry by participating in this project - they should be very proud of creating a beautiful piece of public art like Amaranthine in such an iconic building."





Soldiers help teach pupils about Remembrance

History was brought to life for pupils at Ss Peter & Paul Catholic Primary School's first armed forces workshop ahead of Remembrance Sunday.

Year 6 pupils had the opportunity to taste the food in ration packs, try on helmets and have a go at a paintball shooting range.

A display was installed in the school hall which included lots of items. These included an area to celebrate diversity, a family picture book and visual history, a ration book, an identity card, a book of wartime recipes, a Women's Land Army leaflet, knitted poppies and books covering World War I and II.

Learning mentor and deputy safeguarding lead Stephanie Gordon and Year 6 teaching assistant Brenna Ruffley taught the children about World Wars I and II last term and wanted to be make it more real in the countdown to Remembrance Day.

Miss Gordon contacted Company Sergeant Major W02 Barrington Brown of the 1st Battalion Mercian Regiment, who brought along some of his soldiers as well as Staff Sergeant Carl Shankland and Sergeant Phil Edis from the Army Reservists to hold a series of workshops.

She said: "When we held the workshops on World War I and II, one of the sessions focused on how ethnic groups fought in both wars which we all found interesting.

"We wanted to take it a step further, so I contacted the 1st Battalion Mercian Regiment and Barrington was able to bring his team along to the school.

"It was really to give the children a better understanding of why we celebrate Remembrance Day.

"Sometimes children wear a poppy but they don't know the history behind it and the role World War I and II played in shaping our lives today.


"They have all really enjoyed being involved in all the different exercises and this has given them a different perspective on war as well as increasing their knowledge.

"They found it interesting to find out that 24-hour ration packs today are suited to different diets such as vegan or vegetarian and they had a chance to taste the biscuits and sweets.

"I would like to thank everyone involved who helped to make this a really special learning day for the children."

"We are so grateful to have received this funding boost to enable the trust to continue providing support, community and fun for children who need to experience joy and laughter, especially in the run-up to Christmas," she said.

"We have worked closely with the Romero Academy before to provide students with access to our services, so it is a real honour that they have chosen to support the Andrew Robinson's Young People's Trust at their event.

"To send just one child on the Christmas Residential costs just over £100, so the money raised will be very beneficial in allowing these children to experience a much-needed break."

The money was raised through the raffle prizes at the event with top prizes including a Wasps shirt signed by Tom Cruse, football boots donated by former Coventry City and Everton player Bassala Sambou and family tickets for the production of The Snow Queen donated by The Albany Theatre.


